Tuesday lunch:

Due to the library's layout, our two library staff are in two of the three rooms, so I set to work on my next window display in the third room. My favourite 'library' quote is Jorge Luis Borges' "I have always imagined that paradise will be a kind of library", so I just have to put this up!

A few other posters go up too, and then I lay out a pile of book review forms for students to help themselves to, which I can then post onto our blog. Fingers crossed we get some takers!

Wednesday morning:

Wednesday afternoon:

Wednesday is my other half-day, so I go home and eat lunch, and then drive myself up to Harlaxton College, the study abroad campus for the American University of Evansville. Volunteering at Harlaxton in the library is a highlight of my week...not least because of our tea break! Working in the library provides a unique, new perspective on library work- I'm currently working through cataloguing our new travel library on Heritage LMS.

I meet my assigned author, Tim Collins (how amazing is he!) and we circulate round the room, chatting to our fellow professionals! The winner, Abbie Craske, is announced (congratulations Abbie!) and then it's the presentation of gifts, followed by refreshments. I'm a happy librarian today, as I've come back with ten signed books, and it's been fantastic to experience my first real 'networking'.

Friday morning:

Back to school, so I share my London experience story with my school librarian. We have a long discussion, and one topic gets us thinking- how can we increase library usage amongst the 6th form? (I suppose you could say this is my area of expertise!) I'm currently working on a reading list for A-Level English Literature students, and the librarian targets staff who are teaching 6th form sets, to make them aware of potentially useful resources. We'll have to wait and see what happens.

I head off to form period, and then I'm back straight away, to 'do' my hour in the school archives! We have two volunteer school archivists who sort the archives every Friday morning, and since October 2011, I've been helping. At the moment, I'm undertaking the interesting task of creating a list of where/what all our old boys have done- and I'm currently up to 1932. There are some fantastic stories I chuckle over with the archivists.

Friday lunchtime:

New task- a book bunting display over our library entrance door! To get some ideas, I discuss the new accessions with the librarian, and then I log onto the computer and print off some colourful book covers-I'll then take them home and laminate them, and on Monday, the new display will go up!

Ruth Hunt – A self-proclaimed 'super-fan' of LGBT Youth Fiction, Stonewall's Chief Executive is really looking forward to reading your poems and short stories!

Northern Lights Graphic Novel News

For several months I have been hearing whispers about a graphic novel adaptation of Philip Pullman's Northern Lights trilogy. However owing to more pressing concerns I let them float by with a mental note to check it out when I had some time.

Well that time is now. The first book has been broken up into three volumes and is called *Les Royaumes du Nord*.

It is being published in French with an English translation to follow and has been adapted by Stéphane Melchior-Durand and drawn by Clément Oubrerie.

Clément Oubrerie is best-known for his work as artist on the Aya of Yop City series.

Les Royaumes du Nord has already been recognized at Angoulême International Comics Festival, winning Le Prix Jeunesse d'Angoulême 2015 (the Youth Award)

The artwork looks amazing, but not speaking French I will have to wait for the translation, but am looking forward to experiencing this wonderful story in a new format.
